3 Steps for disaster preparation. Start with Step 1, then also do Step 0 and Step 2.

Preparation Step 0 Carry At All Times!

Among the items to be prepared as "emergency items," take with you those items that are easily portable, in a bag you usually use or a pocket! Carry around a sense of security against disasters nobody can predict but that can strike at any time and any place.



Preparation Step 1 Emergency Items

Home or work Prepare "emergency items" at the location where you spend most of your day! Place them in a compact bag that you can quickly take with you as you evacuate when the time comes.

- Prepare the minimum necessities that you want to have with you when you evacuate to a safe location on the first day of the disaster.
- Prepare also items to protect your head and feet when you evacuate.
- Where to keep these items? The entrance, the bedroom...any location allowing easy access.

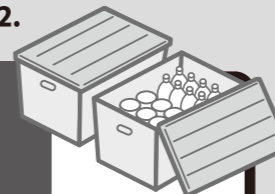
It's also a good idea to keep a spare set in the car trunk.



Preparation Step 2 Safety Stocks

Stockpile items that will tide you over for a few days in the event that lifelines are cut off and no help is forthcoming during a disaster!

- Place these items in cases that are easy to take out and carry, and keep these cases in your kitchen, closet, garage, storage room, etc.
- Keep a supply of at least 3 days of consumable items such as food and drinks.
- Devise a peace-of-mind giving set of items that will tide you over at your home during times of disaster when lifelines are cut off.



Four points to keep in mind when preparing items

Run a check twice a year!

- Schedule the next check date.
- Check the best-before date of food and beverages and the expiration date of medicines and batteries, among other things, and replace items with new ones as necessary. Check that there are no old or degraded items.
- Consume preserved food when replacing it.
- Check seasonal necessities such as clothing twice a year, in the spring and fall, to rotate them.

Learn and master how to use your items!

- It is only by learning how to use your items that they will come in handy during emergencies. Create opportunities to familiarize yourself with your items and learn how to use them with your body.
- How to tie ropes
- How to use portable toilets
- Contents of first aid kit, how to tend to injuries
- How to use a sling
- Basic protective gear against the cold (survival blanket) ... etc.

The versatility of everyday items: Learn resourcefulness and acquire know-how!

- Items we use on a daily basis can be put to various uses during emergencies. Learn the potential uses of each item and actually try them out.
- Newspaper, plastic wrap, plastic bags...
- Find out about the knowledge and ideas available from those who have been through disasters.
- Obtain and check out information from websites, etc.

Prepare for mutual assistance in addition to "self-help."

- In emergencies, anybody might be called upon to help or be in need of help. Besides the measures at your own home, check where preparations for mutual assistance are being made, for example at neighborhood associations or residents' associations, and what they consist of.
- Check for hazard maps, emergency action guidelines, and preparedness information from your municipality.
- Participate in local disaster drills.

Disaster Mitigation Checklist (Things to Prepare)

The 0 marked in the [0] Carry, [1] Emergency Items, and [2] Safety Stocks columns indicate supplementary information on which items to prepare for steps 0, 1, and 2.

Using the 0 marks as reference, consider which preparations to make for home, work, and/or school.

Plan and implement all 3 steps regarding the items and quantities/amounts you will need.
